

# What is the proper way for a translator to notarize my documents to apostille?

If you need to hire and use a translator to translate documents that you want apostilled, authenticated, or legalized.

You can copy/paste, print out, get notarized (**you can ONLY use a Texas notary no other states**) and **attach with a paper clip along with your translated documents and a copy of the original document** to this Certificate of Translation certificate that has been approved to use by the Texas Secretary of State.
